

PREFACE

In the pages following, we have put together some of the sermons and material that was used by the late James D. Corson. Every preacher has his own technique in delivering the great message of God's Word, and brother Corson was not without his. For all of you who consider this material, our hope is that it will bring back the memory of this fervent preacher who was so dedicated to the saving of souls.

Brother Corson left this scene of life, May 29, 1976, thus making a book of this nature a little more difficult to compile. We can only rely on his notes and charts he had kept. One thing that has been a great help is that he was known for using charts in his preaching. Sister Corson has been wonderful to get these together to make this book possible.

It is sad that we generally notice the great works of men after they are gone. This has been true of some of the greatest, even Jesus Christ himself. He was rejected, and despised of men while on the earth, but now is remembered as the greatest man who ever lived, affecting the lives of men more than any other.

It takes a lot of sacrifice to be a Gospel preacher, and certainly brother Corson did a lot of it. He and sister Corson had quite a large family but this did not stop him from traveling, conducting meetings and several times staying with a congregation to build them up. When it came to personal work, he was a believer in it and one of the greatest. We must not forget the sacrifice of his wife and children, but I'm sure when they consider the great work he has done and the many souls he was instrumental in saving, it was worth it all.

I have spent many enjoyable visits in their delightful home in the years before brother Corson died. He always loved to tell of the stories of his preaching career. They were thrilling and exciting as I would sit and listen, for I too was starting down that same road, and he was telling me of some of the things I would face. I only wish that somehow we could have taped those stories for they themselves would make for wonderful reading.

I guess I owe this man a great deal. He was very instrumental in getting me started in the preaching field. He was an inspiration to me. He often called me his son in the faith, just as Paul did Timothy, and I shall always remember this.

We do not claim that the material in this book is completely original with brother Corson. Some of the sermons were of his own making, others we are not certain of. When preaching the Word of God, there are some basic principles that are proclaimed exactly the same, but each preacher puts his personal touch in the delivering of that sermon. We hope you will be able to see the distinct characteristics of brother Corson in these sermons. We have also added some of the poems he used in preaching and some that his dear wife has written through the years.

We hope that this book will be a great help to those who will be delivering sermons in the local congregations and to those who endeavor to preach the Gospel. Thus, by doing this 2 Tim. 2:2 will be carried out . . . "And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also."

A BIOGRAPHY

James Daniel Corson was born May 11, 1904 in Hastings, Pennsylvania, the son of Akey Corson and Mary Jane (Clark) Corson. Jim was one of a family of nine children; six boys and three girls. Mr. Corson owned and operated a small truck farm and some timber land. World War I was just ending and the country was blooming with opportunities. The Corson family sold their land and home, and went to the state of Wyoming in the year of 1920. The cattle, horse, and sheep ranches were all open for help. The older children soon married, and Jim took to the boots and saddle on a horse ranch, rounding up strays and caring for them. Soon after that he went to Denver, Colorado, and worked on the Government irrigation system for a time. Hearing of work in St. Louis, he moved to that area to work on a housing project. From there he wended his way back to Pennsylvania to his home place and relatives.

On January 4th, 1927, he was married to Clarissa Ann Weakland (Dovie, her daddy's choice name), of Irvona, Pennsylvania. They went back to St. Louis and stayed for about fourteen months, where their first child was born. They then moved back to Pennsylvania where Jim worked in the coal mine in Nanty Glo, Pennsylvania. It was here that he met brother Salyards, the dear old preacher who led us to Christ and the church. Jim was not happy coming into the Catholic Faith, and he and I gladly accepted when brother Salvards invited us into his home to study the Bible. Soon others joined us and the big dining room table was full. Brother Salyards and his good wife Nory, as we learned to call her, their two daughters, son, and son-in-law all made us feel as part of the family. We were all anxious and sincere; each lesson was an inspiration. We all looked forward to them. The two big kerosene lamps splashing the warm welcoming glow across the room made it all seem sacred. We could all read our own verse in our turn, and ask questions, and talk about it. Just a chapter each night from Matthew to Revelations, but brother Salyards on the side lines would

smoothly, patiently, and lovingly tell us how no preacher or priest could bury a person in a bowl of water and leave them feeling they had been buried with Christ in baptism. And how we had to be a workman that needed not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth. He continued to teach us how baptism was an adoption into God's family, and that we were to be baptized in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost. He also taught us that Jesus taught his disciples that upon the great confession of Peter (the Rock) that he would build his church and the gates of hell would not prevail against it. We also learned that we could still sin after becoming his child and fall short of the glory of God.

We were both baptized in the latter part of May, 1930, by the Elder brother Benny at Bolivar, Pennsylvaina after being taught and grounded in the faith by brother Salyards. Seeing the need of furthering the gospel to a sin-sick world. Jim spent most of forty-six years spreading the good news through much of the United States.

We once believed that the communion loaf was to be broken into two pieces before partaking, and the contents of the cup was to be strong wine, but the kind old brother James R. Stewart from Texas taught us lovingly and sternly that if everyone broke the bread into two pieces, they soon would have too many two's and no body would be represented or eaten, thus confusing the sacred ordinance. The same with the cup, the fruit of the vine, not fermented wine, because the blessing is in the cluster. The juice is not fermented in the cluster and Christ's body did not see corruption. As with the coat without seams, let us not rend it. Let's leave it whole.

In Jim's earlier days he never was much interested in books and learning and was no artist with a brush or pen. But when it came to the Gospel and the Truth of God's Word and the presenting of it, he was a master of his art. He was a fighter all the way. When it came to innovations in the worship, such as women teachers, music, individual cups, etc., he was totally against them. Jim preached in a good many states and worked

with most if not all of the congregations in Pennsylvania. These churches are to be commended. They have preached a lot of Gospel through Jim's preaching, by their offerings and gifts of meats, vegetables, fruits, and even clothing, car payments, etc.

He also lived to see all of his ten children (five girls and five boys) baptized, half of them by himself, and most of his in-law children. Between 1938 and 1940 he baptized his aged mother, two brothers and their wives, and two teenage nephews all in one group. In another group he baptized his youngest sister and her husband and a group of her in-laws. In Casper, Wyoming he baptized twelve. There are records of so many more, yet he did not keep records of all. He never boasted of the many.

Through his last remaining years he preached as he could at the local congregations near home. Because of a worsening heart condition and the coal miners' disease, his earthly life ended with his greatest hopes that the younger evangelists and preachers take the gospel message on. Jim lived to see some of his work going forward. As the children grew older and had families of their own, they saw the necessity of tight spots and that Daddy needed to go on in the work. They all helped and still are helping Mother when needed.

Daddy's memories linger on and we are grateful to those who helped make it all possible.

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HOW MANY?

We would like to ask two questions in our discussion. First of all, How many gods are there? And second, How many churches are there?

In answer to these questions, we must turn to the word of God. In regard to the question concerning God, let us notice these figures. Man has always wanted to worship many gods instead of the one true God. The Greeks worshipped not one supreme God, but 30,000 imaginary gods. The Hindus worshipped around 333,000,000 different gods.

In Exodus 20:3, Moses writes, "Thou shalt have no other gods before me." Moses said, "Hear, O Israel: Jehovah our God is one Jehovah: And thou shalt love Jehovah thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might" (Deut. 6:4).

We can read where Paul writes the Corinthians, "For though there be that are called gods, whether in heaven or on earth; as there be gods many, and lords many; yet to us there is one God, the Father, of whom are all things, and we in him; and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things, and we through him" (1 Cor. 8:5). Then, last of all, concerning the one God, we read in 1 Cor. 12:6, "And there are diversities of working, but the same God, who worketh all things in all."

I truly believe that we can see there is only one God. Now if there is only one God, how many churches did that God establish? Did He establish nearly 400 churches, or just one? Again, we turn to God's word to find the answer. In Matt. 16:18 we read of the coming of the church; "Thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." Then in Acts 2:47 we read, "And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved." Let us notice that the church has been established. But in the foregoing passages of scripture, it is *church* not churches. "And hath put all things under his feet, and gave him to be head over all things,

to the church, which is his body, the fullness of him that filleth all in all' (Eph. 1:22).

As we come to a close, we need to ask and answer these questions: 1. How many gods are there? If only one, why not serve Him? 2. How many churches are there? If there is only one true church, then why not become a member of it and serve God faithfully until the end of your life?

THE CHRISTIAN IN A WORLD AT WAR

SCRIPTURES

"Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers. For there is no power but of God; the powers that be are ordained of God. Whosoever resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God; and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation. For rulers are not a terror to good works, but to the evil. Wilt thou then not be afraid of the power? Do that which is good, and thou shalt have praise of the same. For he is the minister of God to thee for good. But if thou do that which is evil, be afraid; for he beareth not the sword in vain; for he is the minister of God, a revenger to execute wrath upon him that doeth evil. Wherefore, ye must needs be subject, not only for wrath, but also for conscience sake. For this cause pay ye tribute also; for they are God's ministers, attending continually upon this very thing" (Rom. 13:1-6).

"Submit yourselves to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake, whether it be to the king, as supreme; or unto governors, as unto them that are sent by him for the punishment of evildoers, and for the praise of them that do well. For so is the will of God, that with well doing ye may put to silence the ignorance of foolish men" (1 Pet. 2:13-15).

Then Peter and the other apostles answered and said, "We ought to obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:29).

"Recompense to no man evil for evil. Provide things honest in the sight of all men. If it be possible, as much as lieth in you, live peaceably with all men. Dearly beloved, avenge not yourselves, but rather give place unto wrath; for it is written, Vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord. Therefore if thine enemy hunger, feed him; if he thirst, give him drink, for in so doing thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head" (Rom. 12:17-20).

"Ye have heard that it hath been said, An eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth. But I say unto you, That ye resist not evil; but whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other also. Ye have heard that it hath been said, Thou shalt love thy neighbor, and hate thine enemy. But I say unto you, LOVE your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you and persecute you" (Matt. 5:38-39, 43-44).

"Jesus answered, My kingdom is not of this world; if my kingdom were of this world, then would my servants fight, that I should not be delivered to the Jews but now is my kingdom not from hence" (John 18:36).

OBSERVATIONS

- 1. The laws of Christ are the same in time of war as in time of peace. The declaration of war does not repeal the laws of Christ. Therefore, the attitude of the Christian toward his government is the same in time of war as in time of peace. There are some functions which are necessary for the government to perform, such as those which might involve one in acts of violence or the taking of human life, which the Christian cannot engage in either in time of peace or in time of War. But there are many useful and needed services, consistent with the principles of Christianity and essential to the welfare of the country, in which Christians can engage both in time of peace and in time of war.
- 2. The laws of Christ are universal—they are the same to Christians in one country as to Christians in another country. Therefore the attitude of Christians in one country toward their government should be the same as that of Christians in any other country. Ours is not the only country to take up arms against their fellow men. The same laws enjoin members of the church in other lands to do likewise, and brethren in Christ will meet on the field of battle. (And this does not take into account the thousands whom Christian combatants might send into eternity unprepared to meet God.)
- 3. The spirit of Christ and the spirit of war cannot be reconciled. The spirit of "an eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth" and the spirit of "render to no man evil for evil" and "love your enemies" cannot dwell together. The latter is the spirit of Christ.

- 4. The Christian is engaged in a spiritual warfare. Although he walks in the flesh, he does not war after the flesh. His weapons are not carnal. He is a citizen of a kingdom which is not of this world.
- 5. The Christian must not have a rebellious attitude toward his government, but must obey the laws of the land insofar as they do not conflict with the laws of God, but in case of such a conflict, the Christian *must* choose the higher authority, and *must*, at all costs, obey God rather than men.

OBJECTIONS CONSIDERED

- 1. The Bible teaches us to be in subjection to the civil powers. True. And the sincere conscientious objectors, of all people, desire to be law-abiding citizens, but they *cannot* violate the law of God to obey the law of men. The wife is to submit to her husband in all things, but certainly not in that which is contrary to divine law (Eph. 5:22-23, Col. 3:18-19). A conscientious objector in this country is not a law breaker, for the law recognizes him if he is sincere.
- 2. God approved war in Old Testament times. True again. But we are living in New Testament times under the law of Christ which forbids violence on the part of the servants of Christ (Matt. 5:38-39, Col 2:14, Heb. 1:1-2). The kingdom of fleshly Israel was both civil and religious in nature, but the kingdom of Christ is altogether spiritual.
- 3. What would you do in case an enemy invaded your house? What one *might* do in a moment of excitement does not alter the law. Such a question is beside the point. What does the law say? It says that Christians should be willing to take joyfully the spoiling of their goods (Heb. 10:34). It says that we are not to fear them which kill the body but cannot kill the soul (Matt. 10:28). "And whosoever will lose his life for my sake shall find it" (Matt. 16:25).
- 4. How can you accept the protection of the government and not be willing to fight for it? How could Paul? More than once he appealed to the Roman government for protection, being

himself a Roman citizen, but he would never have bourne carnal weapons (Acts 22:24-29, 2 Cor. 10:3-5). God has ordained the civil powers for the protection of those who do well, but Christians must not kill nor take vengeance (Rom 12:19, 13:4).

- 5. Is it fair for some to have to fight while others do nothing for the country and are protected in their cowardice? Is it fair for sinners to reap the benefits that come to society from Christianity while they do nothing to support it? The principles of Christianity are the only basis of lasting peace. The sinner opposes these principles. But conscientious objectors are doing something for the country. There is much more need in many ways for non-combatants in this war than for combatants. It is estimated that fourteen workers are needed for every soldier. Conscientious objectors are not cowards. They have braved public scorn for their Master.
- 6. Is the soldier personally responsible for his acts as an agent of the government? Pilate, as an agent of the Roman government, condemned Christ to die when he knew he was innocent. Was he responsible? David, as king of Israel, even under a temporal/spiritual economy, was responsible for his acts as a man of war (1 Chron. 28:3). Yes, we are responsible for all of our acts. "Every work will be brought into judgment" (Eccl. 12:14, 2 Cor. 5:10).
- 7. How about paying taxes, obeying government orders, etc.? Christians are to render unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's, and unto God the things that are God's (Matt. 22:21). We are commanded by the Lord to pay taxes. Taxes bear the stamp of the government, and belong to it for whatever use it may desire. But our bodies belong to God, and are to be presented as living sacrifices to Him (Rom. 12:1, 1 Cor. 6:19-20).
- 8. But we must fight for religious freedom. It is true that God has worked providentially through temporal governments to provide religious freedom, but this does not prove that Christians should resort to the sword to gain that freedom (John 18:36). In some periods of history, when the persecutions of the church have been the strongest, it has made the greatest pro-

gress. For centuries after the founding of the church, its members refused to fight, yet this period of greatest persecution was the period of the greatest progress for Christianity.

THE DIVORCE EVIL

I realize that I am not on the popular side in this world when I speak as I do on the divorce evil. It cost John the Baptist's life to condemn the divorce evil. Christ's enemies tried to trap him with the same issue, and his enemies are still doing him an injustice by misapplying his teaching on divorce. Therefore, I feel that in obedience to the Lord's will which says to "Prove all things" (1 Thess. 5:21), and to "Abhor that which is evil" (Rom. 12:9), I am obligated to write this. An investigation of the truth from an unbiased standpoint will show us that God is not pleased with such a degrading problem as divorce. God said He hates divorce (Mal. 2:16).

God gave man one wife in the beginning and said they were no more two, but one flesh. To make one out of two is to join, unite, weld, or make cohesive, and that man and woman shall leave father and mother and cleave to each other so long as they live.

This was God's divine way of marriage and His way of making the home so as to replenish the earth with human life. Seven generations passed before any man had more than one wife. Then man *took* (he took, God did not give) another wife. Jesus endorsed God's plan in the beginning by saying, "What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder" (Matt. 19:5-6, Mark 10:9).

The enemies of Jesus, a brigade of officers and mob-spirited critics, came to him trying to trap him, hoping they might get him to say something against, or break the law of Moses, so they could have a charge against him. This being a special case under the old law, Jesus gave them a special answer, and referred them to the law as if to tell them the law would answer their question. Jesus was not talking to his disciples then about something that was to be applied in general. When they told him "Moses granted divorce," he told them that Moses did so because of the hardness of their hearts, as if to disapprove of it himself and

then climaxed the conclusion by saying, "In the beginning, it was not so, for God made one out of two, and what God hath joined together, let no man put asunder."

Does that sound like a permit for divorce, when divorce means the annulment, dissolving of marriage, or putting asunder? When Jesus said there was an exception of fornication, he did not approve or permit divorce to be applied in the Christian age because that would be contradictory to what he just said. Since Jesus condemns the idea of putting asunder and marrying again (which divorce permits), it is a conclusive evidence that Christ did not permit a divorce. The only place the exception could have been used was in a case such as Joseph when he thought he had found some uncleanness in Mary. And this was yet under the law. Now, after Christ and his disciples went into the house out of the presence of his enemies, his disciples asked him again concerning divorce, and he never used the exception. He just told them that "Whosoever putteth away his wife and marries another commits adultery," which is God's real plan from the beginning. What Jesus told his disciples (Mark 10:10-12) was a lesson to be applied in general because it was brought over and taught in the Christian age (Rom. 7:1-3, 1 Cor. 7:39). No exception or permit was there, but rather a condemnation of the divorce evil.

Now the truth of the matter is that Jesus was asked a special question in Matt. 19:1-9, (in a special case while the old law was still in force) by his enemies, hoping he would say something against the law. Therefore he gave them a special answer by reminding them of God's divine plan of marriage in the beginning, and that no man put asunder what God hathjoined together. The answer Jesus gave was designed to restore the sanctity of marriage and the home to its original status. The idea is that man and woman shall be mated together by voluntary selection of each other and this relation should be maintained during the lifetime of both parties, because the two are made one in marriage. To be willing to permit a thing is to encourage it. Now, since God did not institute divorce and said he hates it (Mal. 2:16),

and since Christ discourages it and condemns it by his teaching to his disciples and has given no exception or permit in the new law, it is not permitted by Christ. Anyone who teaches that Christ permits divorce in the Christian age because he used the expression of the exception for fornication in that special case under the law, is putting his own interpretation on the subject, thus making a mis-application of God's Word. They are making the Bible inconsistent and making the teaching of Christ contradictory by trying to fit the truth of God's Word to the wisdom of this world.

By the grace of God, the scripture has been translated into our own tongue and is so plain that the common person can understand for themselves. The modernistic wisdom of this world has fit their own interpretation into the scriptures by mis-applying them, and it just helps to keep the unsettled mind bewildered on this subject. Therefore, agreeing with some scholar, PHD or LLD who has his own conglomerated theory while he misapplies the truth is dangerous.

Error is more dangerous, does more damage when allied with truth. There is one thing that God has never permitted. That is for man to tell Him (God) what is right. Anyone who presumes to know the mind of the Lord, where He has not spoken, or to change the Lord's will, will ultimately come to the same end as Nadab and Abihu when they offered strange fire. Making a law and claiming it to be God's law when He did not inaugerate it is a very dangerous thing. This is exactly what some have done with God's law on marriage and divorce.
